In 1987 we returned from Yeovil to live in Pat's grandfather's house', built in 1939, and continued to return to our church in Yeovil once a month.

One Saturday morning we visited the old church's Autumn
Fair where they were fund
raising for the redevelopment
and where David Spracklen
provided us with a copy of the
Business Plan. We returned in
the afternoon where we took part
in a competition to guess how
long it took Hazel Rodenhurst to
paint a picture. A telephone call
that evening confirmed Barbara
had won the painting.

On the Sunday morning we attended church where Rev Paul Mears welcomed us to the dais to collect the picture in front of a sea of smiling faces and a feeling of warmth and acceptance. The rest as they say is history. November 2003 and the new Broadstone Methodist Church

Centre is ready for opening. Some weeks earlier explanatory leaflets were delivered to every property in Broadstone detailing our new facilities and giving Pat's name and telephone number for contact as the Booking Officer. As neither of us were IT proficient we purchased a large Boots Diary using the old pen and paper method.

The phone started to ring with enquiries from people running all manner of different activities and wishing to see the rooms we had on offer.

Within a few weeks many of these groups had taken up residence and we were home to U3A, Language Classes, Art Classes, Pilates and Tai Chai to name but a few.

The premises seemed to be occupied from 9am to late evening. The income from all the classes amounted to £16,000 in the first year.

The icing on the cake was the opening of our wonderful coffee lounge where the volunteers welcomed back "old" friends as well as many newcomers who have since become friends.

We continued with the bookings for some four years when we handed it back to the church where it became computerised with a paid administrator.

As we look back over the last twenty years Pat and I are grateful for the opportunity of being able to help our church family achieve their dream of "reaching out to the community" a reality.

BUILDING THE VISION

A Potted History

The new premises of Broadstone Methodist Church Centre will be officially opened on 13 December 2003. We give thanks to God! Even then, we shall not have fulfilled our Vision, but we shall have a superb resource in which to fulfil our Vision.

How did it all start?

Back in 1997, our previous Minister, Rev Paul Mears, challenged the Broadstone Methodist people to explore the future of our church: Worship, Mission, Fellowship and Spiritual Growth, Youth, and the Church Building were the topics of those Vision Days.

In addition to other challenges which emerged, these discussions prompted us to acknowledge we had an ageing building, inadequate for our growing congregation and with very limited space and poor facilities for the community work we felt called to extend. The problems must be addressed. We had no intention of demolishing our building and starting again, but the Methodist Property Division and the District Commission called in to look at our situation thought otherwise! The advice given was 'pull it down and start again'!

This was, indeed, a challenge far bigger than anticipated, but our people felt it was from God, and after prayerful consideration, accepted this challenge.

At the outset, the enormity of the task came home to those involved (and at the time we were only talking about having to raise £750,000 – it rose to over £1.3m.). We were a group of people aware that we had little experience of tacking such a project, but we believed that when God calls, He enables – though, at the time, it







wasn't easy to see how this would come about!

God's hand in events soon became obvious. A link was made with a contact in Help the Aged (just sounding them out to see if we may qualify for a small grant!) and we learnt that in certain projects of benefit to the elderly, the Charity may offer support with the help of a fundraiser at no expense to the organisation. This was exciting news, but would we qualify?

The rest is history most of us know. After being guided by Help the Aged through a Feasibility Study, it was agreed our project did satisfy their criteria and Chris Hepworth was assigned to us as our fundraiser. He helped us produce a Business Plan and then worked alongside David Spracklen, Chairman of our Fundraising Team, sending letters of appeal to hundreds of Trusts and Charitable Organisations. Chris brought wise counsel from the wide experience of Help the Aged and supported David when

the going was tough...and, when it was really tough, introduced us to the Bradbury Foundation whose grant of £250,000 to our redevelopment fund really turned the tide! We are greatly indebted to them for all that they have done on our behalf.

Early on, the Redevelopment Team chose the slogan 'Building the Vision' to attach to our project, since then countless people have worked tirelessly towards building that vision. David Lambert, of Saunders, Architects, was appointed to design the building. His brief was difficult. Our site was small and we required space; he's achieved wonders. Bob Pickford and George Yates have, in turn. Chaired the Planning Team which bore great responsibility on behalf of the Church; Larry LaRiviere and Bob Jordan have liaised with the architect and contractors - an enormous task – I suspect at times they wondered if we were building St. Paul's Cathedral! Furniture has been moved out, and furniture will be moved in ~ man-power and

horse-power have been freely offered to these tasks. We have leafleted over 5000 homes in the locality giving them information about Broadstone Methodist Church Centre ~ people have folded these leaflets, others have walked the streets delivering them.

Thousands of pounds have been donated by our own people demonstrating their solidarity to the project. In addition, there have been countless fundraising events and we thank the many people who have organised and supported Fairs, concerts, shows, skittle evenings, line-dances...we even had a tea-dance, a sponsored swim and some sponsored dieting! We have had a variety of social gatherings, we've put on meals, eaten meals (and paid for them!) had Open-Air Theatre, made cakes, purchased cakes, painted pictures and sold pictures...in total our own Church has given or raised approaching half a million pounds. Together with the grants and donations from the Methodist Church and many Trusts and organisations, this building has been made possible. We acknowledge with gratitude the sacrificial giving of so many in both time and money.

Pat Talbot and his Operations
Team now have the task of
ensuring all that has been planned
comes into being. Many helpers
will be needed and it's another
daunting situation, but we can look
back and see where we've come
from ~ with God's help, it can be
done!

As we embark on the fulfilment of our vision to Share the Good News of Jesus and Serve the Community in our new suite of premises, to God be the glory!

FROM THE OLD TO THE NEW

COLOURED GLASS

The coloured glass panel between the Sanctuary and the Quiet Room was originally installed in the Broadstone Chapel in 1921.

It was given by Mr Osman Brown, an architect who lived in Dunyeats Road near the bowling green, in memory of his infant son.

Mr Brown designed an extension to the chapel in 1922, and his glass panel was retained in that and in subsequent extensions and now has pride of place in our rebuilt church.



The tapestry hanging in the church was made in 1990, and was originally in the old building. It was designed by Pam Wilson, who also supervised its creation, which involved very many members of the church community at that time - even if some did only a few background stitches. It represents aspects of life in Broadstone 100 years earlier when the first Methodist Church was built.

It now has a prominent position in the new sanctuary, and features in a recent guide to Poole, with the comment 'Forget life's rich tapestry; visit Broadstone's rich tapestry'! A leaflet with details of the scenes represented is available in the magazine stand.

PAINTING

In the corridor is a highly distinctive painting by members of the Tuesday evening Junior Club at the old building in October 2000. The youngsters were guided by Dennis Hill, but I'll leave its interpretation to you.







ETCHED GLASS

The two panels, now hanging in the corridor outside the sanctuary, used to be the glass between the coffee lounge and the sanctuary in the old church. When that was demolished the panels were rescued and stored in a safe place but then, sadly, they were forgotten.

Recently we were reminded that they were there and now needed to be removed. As this coincided with the 20 year celebrations it was suggested that they could be framed and hung somewhere in the building. That proved to be something of a challenge due to hidden electrical cables. However after a great deal of thought and effort they now hang proudly in place. Many thanks to all involved in this challenging task. Do have a look at the wonderful designs.





KARIBUNI CHILDREN



When we started fundraising for the new building, we felt that it was important not to focus solely on our own financial needs, but to show support for a charitable project in the wider world at the same time. So it was agreed that 10% of funds raised locally by our own members and friends would be donated to the charity now named Karibuni Children, a small charity run by a Methodist minister and his family, who were known to some of our members.

her parents Corinne paid all her money at that time into the bank where the manager agreed to open an account for her charity with £2.56! Karibuni Children was registered as a UK charity in 1995 and has grown from there. The initial fundraiser was a sponsored bike ride from Edinburgh to London where she raised £13,500 – enough to start sending money to Kenya for an initial project. I remember Corinne, with her bike, coming onto the stage at the Royal Albert





This Charity began in an unusual way. In 1990 Rev Bill Murphy and his wife Joy and daughter Corinne took part in a 7 month exchange with a minister in Nairobi, Kenya. Corinne helped in the church pre-school nursery and was shocked by the number of children living on the streets. Three years later she suffered severe injuries in a car crash and as she was recovering the memory of those children came back to her. With support from

Hall during an MAYC London Weekend.

In the late Queen's Jubilee year Corinne was awarded the British Empire Medal for her charitable services to Kenya through the Karibuni Trust.

Today Karibuni partners professionally run projects in Kenya run by Kenyans many of whom have been educated by Karibuni support. There are nursery and primary schools and some wider community-based organisations geographically dispersed across Kenya but all in deprived areas. The charity believes in the transformational power of education. Their objective is to help Kenyan children from some of the poorest backgrounds and release themselves from the cycle of poverty.

At any one time they are supporting around 700 children, living in slum communities, to go to school. This includes financial support, providing nutritious meals, uniforms, shoes, learning equipment and feminine hygiene products. They also seek to empower the wider family unit, supporting local developments of small workshops and classes.

Each year a small group of trustees and volunteers, covering their own costs, visit the major projects in Kenya to meet with key project partners, the families and also the young people who have completed their education.

We continue support with fundraising activities but, most importantly, with our prayers.



OUR FURNITURE FAMILY

Mike Brooke talks to DENNIS HILL





There are seven items of church furniture that have an important place in the life of the church (apart from the chairs). One can't help but notice them every time we enter the sanctuary, but how much thought do we give to them? In design they are unique to our church even though one of the items has a different origin from the other six. These could be regarded as a family born out of the current church. They so well


reflect the architectural style of the building and yet retain a degree of individuality.


The family of six consists of

The family of six consists of the Pulpit, Altar Table, Lectern, Font, Bible Stand and Flower Pedestal. Traditionally these would be located at the eastern end of the church within the sanctuary but as our church is oriented north–south rather than east–west we find them at the south end within the area set aside for communion.

At the time the church was still a series of architectural drawings Rev George Yates approached Dennis Hill, then a church steward, with a view to designing four essential items: Altar Table, Pulpit, Lectern, and Font. Dennis, a highly respected local artist, accepted the challenge. Following close examination of several church furniture catalogues, Dennis decided it would be most appropriate if all the items were of a









contemporary style reflecting that of the proposed church.

Constructed in oak by a local firm, Church View Joinery, their simplicity and elegance are a lasting tribute to Dennis and all who were involved in the project. The only drawings that still exist are some sketches in one of Dennis' diaries and show the initial ideas for the Font. Looking at these it is hard to imagine that the finished item would be a unique and multi-functional feature that complements the Altar, Pulpit, and Lectern. Not only is it ideal for baptisms, but it can also serve as a pedestal for





flowers or other decorations. All four items were in place for the opening in December 2003.

It wasn't until June 2009 that the Bible Stand became part of the family. Carrying on with the simple but functional style it sits almost invisibly on the altar yet it is as important as its companions.

The final member of this family is the Flower Pedestal. It was completed in October 2013 in time for the church's 10th anniversary. It was donated by Leila Mears in remembrance of her husband, Rev Paul Mears, minister of the church from 1994 to 2001 and the person who 'drove the vision of our modern building'. It is a taller version of the font, and like all the other family members reflects, and even strengthens,

the strong architectural character of our church.

Finally, the cross. With hidden lighting and an elevated position on the South wall it overlooks the Sanctuary to act as a focus for our worship. It is a reminder not only of God's glory, but also of the sacrifice he made through the death of his Son so that we might be free.

Editorial Note

The first four pieces did not, originally, have the plinths as we see now but the height of the book slopes on the Pulpit and Lectern were found to be too low for taller people. The plinths were added, with shallow versions for the Altar and Font which did not need raising. The later Flower Pedestal was made to match.



DEVELOPING OUR LOGO

At the beginning of the 'Vision' thought was given to an inspiring identity which would focus both thinking and action.



The 'People on the Wall' image was created by Dennis Hill and from it Tee-shirts and Sweatshirts were produced. The 'Building the Vision' strapline was added to this and used as part of the fundraising campaign when people were invited to 'purchase a brick' and an acknowledging certificate was issued.



When the new building was nearing completion the Church Council made the decision that the new building should be called 'Broadstone Methodist Church Centre' and the signage, conforming to the standard Methodist identity was produced, as can be seen on the Noticeboard by the rear entrance and on the wall by the rear door.

At a meeting of the Communications Committee. after Rev Chris Moreton became our minister, it was suggested that we hold a competition to design a new identity. This was agreed by Church Council and the challenge was issued. Only a few members took this up and eventually the logo that we still use today was decided on. This links back to the 'People on the Wall' image, but now without the rows of building bricks and, during the intervening years, the word 'Centre' had been dropped from the name. The strapline 'the church in the community', which had been used from an early date, is included and 'tumbling blocks' have been added, which represent the various aspects of our mission and community involvement.

This logo has been in use for around ten years now and remains a positive identity.

These sunflowers are in my garden. I bought the seeds for them at the Craft Fair for the sunflower growing competition which, unfortunately, didn't happen.


Many flowers are thought of as having a specific meaning and significance. Sunflowers are seen as spiritual flowers that symbolise Faith and Adoration.

WENDY HOUSE

WORKING WITH CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

It may be a sign that I'm growing old but how things have changed in the last 20 years! There are now so many things for youngsters to do, and not just on a Sunday.

We've seen many changes in our work with young people over this time, as we've reached out to meet the needs of our community. Some, such as Junior Club and Holiday Club flourished for a number of years, but came to the end of their attractiveness to young people; others, such as Family Film Night, became victims of Covid; but some, such as Junior Church, carry on and we pray for their continuation. Here's a review of some of the more significant activities.

Messy Church

2011 saw the beginning of Messy Church, first of all on a Sunday afternoon and then moving to meet, usually on a Thursday morning, in each of the school holidays. Messy Church offers craft activities, all based on a theme, games, a short worship session in the sanctuary, followed by a snack lunch which usually includes a food item made during the activity session. Drinks are available throughout the morning. Parents and carers have the opportunity to help their youngsters with all the 10 different things to do. Numbers vary – the largest number we served with lunch was around 120! - now we are around the 40 mark with some people having to leave before lunch.

Children and Families Worker

In 2014 we were delighted to be able to appoint Karen Greene to be our Children and Families Worker providing more opportunities for work with families. Karen was able to make a big contribution with local schools, helping with their assemblies and building strong relationships.



Thirsty Thursday

This developed as a weekly after-school gathering with cookies and drinks, games and story time. Thirsty Thursday continues – now in the Bradbury Hall with Chocolate Brownies proving very popular!

Friday Night on Broadway Broadway was another development offering a meal,

games for the children and the opportunity for parents, carers and other adults to share concerns and discuss relevant issues, to foster our vision to be church in the community.



Where do we go from here?

Sadly, 2020 saw the covid pandemic, and we were unable to give a proper farewell to Karen after her 6 years fostering our work with young people. Covid meant that we wouldn't replace her at the time, and for a number of reasons we haven't been able to do so since, but that is a possibility for the future. Our engagement with children and young people must feature strongly in discussion on our future role. New opportunities have come along with Musical Market days and Family Fun days, and we all need to think positively about how we can best meet the challenges of the future.

In the words of the hymn: We'll praise Him for all that is past and trust Him for all that's to come.
